


To properly export and format annotations and NoodleBib, follow these quick steps:


1. Select the **Print / Export** dropdown, then select **Formatting Options**.

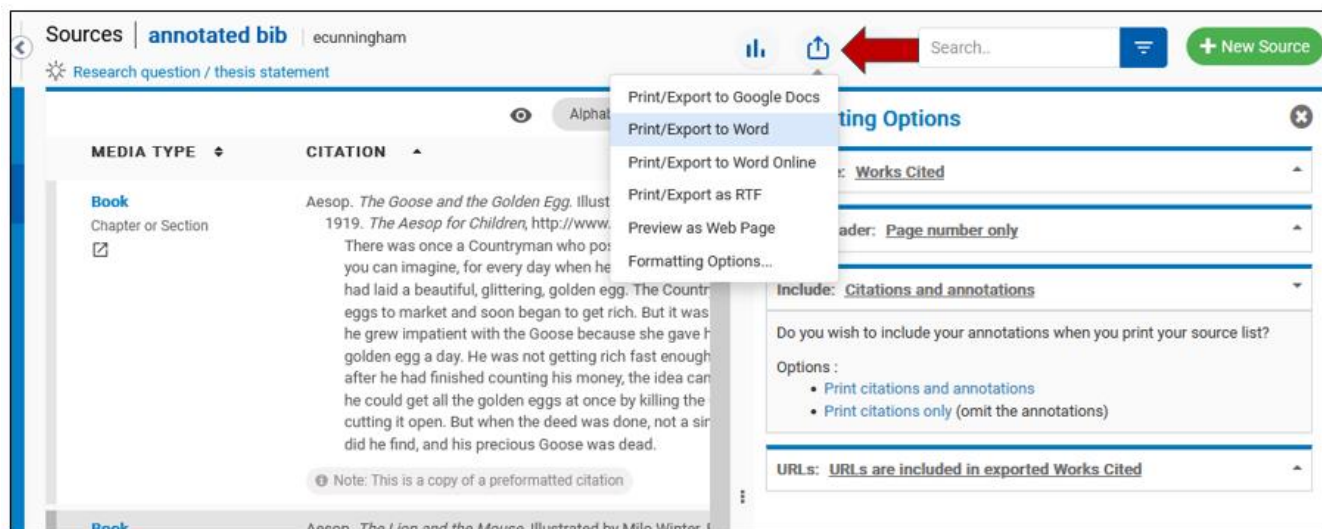
